So be sure to check local ordinances before tossing wrapping paper in the recycling bin.

If you want to buy wrapping paper that can be recycled, experts suggest using simple, glitter-free, non-laminated wrapping paper. Oh, and don't forget to remove any leftover tape!

But besides buying wrapping paper, there's an even more eco-friendly way to wrap your gifts: making your own wrapping paper!

Try wrapping your gifts in craft paper from shipping boxes, which is used as box stuffing and is easily recyclable. Or to add more color and entertainment to the holidays, use old newspaper as wrapping paper (we recommend the comic strips). The kids will love it and adult comic fans will, too!

How to Recycle Shipping Boxes

With gift lists that can sometimes feel endless, online shopping is a great way to give yourself a little more "me-time" during the holidays. Unfortunately, online shopping can also lead to another problem: cardboard. Lots and lots of cardboard.
